CONFIRMED CASES BY COMMUNITY

- There are currently **47 active** COVID-19 cases within First Nations communities.
- The Southwest region has experienced the most cases of COVID-19.
- The current total resolve rate is 96%.
- There have been 2,038 cases in the second and third wave so far, compared to just 66 cases in the first wave.
- First Nations tend to be a lagging indicator, meaning that once cases begin to surge in Ontario cities, First Nations cases begin to rise a few weeks later.
- 11 communities are reporting active cases:

PROVINCIAL MEASURES RESPONDING TO COVID-19


- The province announced \$2 billion for keeping schools safe and supporting learning recovery and renewal. This funding will support mental health and learning recovery.
- Ontario will provide \$25.6 billion to support their annual Grants for Student Needs with \$96.7 earmarked for the Indigenous Education Grant. Indigenous Education will be prioritized with these grants.
- On May 5, Ontario announced an <u>Enhanced Ontario Community Environment Fund</u> which could be used to build resilient communities as well as help hold polluters accountable.
- The province declared their support for the <u>First Nations Economic Growth and</u> Prosperity Table on May 11, 2021.
- The province announced that <u>over 50% of Ontario adults have received at least one dose of the COVID-19 vaccine</u> on May 12, 2021.
- Ontario announced a new <u>Ontario Tourism and Travel Small Business Support Grant</u> on May 13, 2021.
- On May 13, the province announced that it was extending the stay at home order until June 2, 2021.
- The Ontario government will support virtual learning for close to 400 innovative projects at colleges, universities, and Indigenous institutes.
- Ontario released their Three-Step Roadmap to Safely Reopen the Province on May 20.
- Canada and Ontario announced their investment into a new <u>Indigenous Cultural Centre</u> <u>at Algoma University</u>.
- The province announced that they will be <u>expanding vaccine bookings for youth 12 and up</u> on May 21, 2021.

FEDERAL MEASURES RESPONDING TO COVID-19

- On May 4, the government of Canada announced that they will invest \$18 billion in new funding to improve the quality of life and create more opportunities for Indigenous peoples.
 - o \$6 billion over five years for distinctions-based investments.
 - o \$4.3 billion over four year for an Indigenous Community Infrastructure Fund
 - o \$388.9 million in ongoing support for infrastructure in Indigenous communities.
- Health Canada announced their <u>authorization to vaccinate youth aged 12-15 with the Pfizer vaccine</u> on May 5, 2021.
- The federal government announced investments for Indigenous students.
 - \$1.2 billion for investments in the future of First Nations Children.
 - o \$112 million in 2021-2022 to extend the COVID-19 support for children on reserve.
 - o \$150.6 million for the Post-Secondary Student Support Program.
 - \$26.4 million in 2021-2022 through the Post-Secondary Partnerships Program.
- On May 21, 2021, the federal government <u>extended the temporary travel measures</u> restricting entry into Canada by foreign nationals until June 21, 2021.
 - Direct commercial and private passenger flights to Canada from India and Pakistan are also restricted until June 21, 2021.
 - Passengers travelling indirectly from India must take a pre-departure test from a third country before they can continue their journey to Canada.
- Through the 2021 budget, the federal government will invest \$354 million over five years to increase the number of nurses and other medical professional in remote and isolated First Nation communities.

NEW CASES IN ONTARIO

- The daily case counts ranged between 1,000 and 1,800 daily.
- The highest number reported this week was 1,890 on Friday, May 21st.
- The weekly 7-day average reported was 1,441 cases.
- A total of 10,090 cases were reported in Ontario between May 21st and May 27th.



VARIANTS OF CONCERN (VOC) CASES ACROSS ONTARIO

All 34 PHUs have confirmed at least one variant case, but not all have been classified yet.

- A total of 162,340 positive cases to date have been confirmed as one of the known VOCs or a mutation that has not yet been classified.
 - These numbers may actually be higher, with the rising case numbers of mutations. As further testing is completed and specific variant types are confirmed, they are then added to the PHU totals.
 - Due to a lag in testing ability, numbers are not readily available and do not often appear on the chart until a later date.

Active Cases across Ontario:

- A total of 8,078 cases were reported between May 24th and May 30th.
 - o This is a 39% decrease compared to last week's total.
- Number of cases varied between 1000-1400 cases per day.
 - The highest number reported this week was 1,446 cases on Monday May 24th.
- 199,711 COVID-19 tests were completed this week in Ontario.
 - This is an 15% decrease compared to last week's total.
- ICU occupancy and hospitalizations have decreased, but numbers in some areas are still high.
 - 18 out of 34 Public Health Units are at 70% or more capacity of ICU beds occupied.
 - For the first time since the beginning of the year, ZERO ICU's are over 100% occupied.
